This new edition of the Festival will open with the exceptional presence of Symphony Orchestra of the Théâtre Royal de la Monnaie de Bruxelles, the orchestra of which Alain Altinoglu has been musical director since 2016.

After the Lohengrin Prelude, the great French baritone Stéphane Degout will offer us to the public some of Mahler's founding cycles: the poignant Songs of a Wandering Companion.

Romantic music par excellence, it will echo the sublime iridescence of the Prelude to Lohengrin, an opera with which Wagner opened the way to a new aesthetic.

In the second part of the program, Alain Altinoglu will conduct a piece that is dear to him: César Franck's Symphony in D minor which he has just recorded with his other favorite orchestra, the Frankfurt Radio Symphony Orchestra.

This famous Symphony in D minor, a jewel of the late 19th century repertoire, testifies to this unique way of organizing musical time, in its form as well as in its alchemy of instrumental timbres.

Marina Chiche started playing the violin at age 3, played in prestigious venues, recorded records and did research at the University. She has lived in several countries and speaks several languages, including those of music and teaching, which she practices with athletic virtuosity. Today, she looks back on her journey and presents an object that changed her life: her violin. Unexpectedly, between personal anecdotes and historical secrets, she takes us on a

crazy adventure, to conquer the sound space of this strange

instrument, more polyphonic than it seems...

From mermaid dresses to football jerseys, from Paganini to Ginette Neveu, from baroque to manga, including Brazilian forests and organized crime, his violin plays on all terrains! Sport, Ecology, Feminism, with Marina classical music finally resonates with current events and is accessible to everyone, young and old. Concerto is a one-hour performance with images and live music, orchestrated with the help of **Hortense Belhôte**, actress and art historian expert in popularization.

Colmar Municipal Theater - 6:00 p.m.

The Modigliani Quartet has just celebrated its anniversary and produces string quartets of excellence.

Thanks to the support of generous patrons, they have the privilege of playing four exceptional Italian instruments from the 17th and 18th century.

If the general public knows **Stravinsky** essentially as a great master of the orchestra, who knew how to make ballets such as The Firebird, Petrouchka and The Rite of Spring blaze like no other, he also distinguished himself in art more intimate of the string quartet. This is evidenced by these Three Pieces written in 1914 and premiered the following year, in which the Russian composer explores new musical and harmonic horizons. With **Beethoven**'s *Quartet No. 7*, the Modigliani Quartet takes

us back to a completely different modernity: that of a composer fiercely determined to impose his mark on a musical genre that he inherited from Haydn and Mozart, and which he would gradually revolutionize. This first of the three "Razoumovski"

Alain Altinoglu takes us across the Channel to discover British music.

A founding figure, Edward Elgar left his mark on the music history of his country. Make way for the splendid Enigma Variations, a true "hit" of the repertoire. Britten's Serenade (1943) is one of the treasures of 20th century music: inspired by the brilliant horn player Dennis Brain, Britten imagines a set of melodies with absolutely magical sounds, here admirably served by **Ed Lyon**, a young British tenor and Jean-Pierre Dassonville on horn.

Thomas Adès, their heir, is one of the main representatives of the young English musical school. His opera The Tempest, based on Shakespeare, caused - rightly - a big stir: we still remember its French creation at the Opéra national du Rhin in 2004.

What a pleasure to find Renaud Capuçon for this new edition of the Festival!

A loyal fan of the Colmar International Festival, the great violinist chooses here a program which allows him to wear his double hat as violinist and conductor - a First in Colmar!

Apotheosis of dialogue in music, the *Third Brandenburg Concerto* by **J.S Bach** builds a wonderful bridge between chamber music and orchestral music, with its unique way of involving the different instruments sometimes as soloists, sometimes as an ensemble.

With his youthful *Symphony No. 2*, **Beethoven** broke with the models of the past and embarked on a new musical adventure, which was to quickly open the doors to romanticism.

As for the Swiss composer **Frank Martin**, he is undoubtedly their worthy successor: in a language of poignant depth, he reconnects with the genre of the Passion, creating with his *Polyptych* an essential masterpiece of 20th century sacred art. century.

For this first concert of the 12:30 cycle, in partnership with the Conservatoire National Supérieur de Musique et de Danse de Paris, the festival welcomes the young and talented Serbian pianist Nadja Dornik.

She recently participated in the Chopin Festival in Paris and the newspaper Le Monde praised her performance of the finale of Rachmaninov's *Concerto No. 3* during the "Les Arènes Lyriques" Festival in Paris in 2023.

During this Colmar concert, the musician will take the audience on a journey to the end of the 19th and beginning of the 20th century, with two Russian composers who created and composed in France: Scriabin and Stravinsky. **Nadja Dornik** will demonstrate her talent in 3 Scriabin sonatas and the piano transcription of The Firebird!

The **Hába Quartet** invites us on a wonderful journey through the thousand and one facets of Czech music, a rare formation in France, but oh so recognized across the Rhine!

Dvořák's famous *American Quartet* has now established itself as one of the pillars of the repertoire: it takes its name from the fact that the composer wrote it during his stay in the United States, brilliantly mixing influences from Central Europe and new products from North America

Barely earlier, **Smetana**'s *First Quartet*, with its very autobiographical character, its lyrical impulses, its twists of fate and its call for national awakening, is one of the founding monuments of Czech chamber music.



The prodigious Romanian musician George Enescu (1881-1955) left a significant musical legacy, oscillating between Paris and Bucharest. Trained in Paris from the age of 14, Enescu studied composition with masters such as Jules Massenet and Gabriel Fauré, forming connections with prominent performers of his era such as Alfred Cortot, Pablo Casals, Jacques Thibaud and Claude Debussy. As a mentor, he influenced renowned violinists like lvry Gitlis, Christian Ferras and Yehudi Menuhin. Enescu's artistic evolution, exploring neo-romanticism, folklore and impressionism, is at the heart of **Grégoire Torossian**'s project. Born in 2000, he started playing the violin at the age of 4.

In 2018, he joined the CNSMDP in Paris and won international competitions, including Brussels and Bucharest in 2022. This talented young artist already performs in prestigious venues in Europe, making his violin "Faisan Doré" by Jean-Baptiste resonate. Vuillaume.

At his side **Samuel Bismut**, talented pianist born in 1998, passionate about Mozart, Schubert, Chopin and the French repertoire of the 20th century. He stands out for his chiseled playing and elegance, praised at international festivals and competitions. Winner of the Rosa Sabater prize at the premio Jaén 2022 competition in Spain, he is also named to the classic revelations "Talents Adami 2022".

French excellence: Fauré, Saint Saens Colmar Municipal Theater - 6:00 p.m.

"Bewitching phrasing, a bewitching fusion of timbres" (ConcertoNet), "Dazzling and refined" (Diapason), "a balance on the edge, between control and abandon" (Classica), the Talweg, these are 3 exceptional musicians gathered here for a Fauré and Saint-Saëns program.

Contemporaries, both French, **Saint-Saëns** and **Fauré** nevertheless followed two very different aesthetic paths. If the eldest remained throughout his life a fervent defender of a certain idea of classicism and the clarity of forms and harmony, Fauré was on the contrary the man through whom impressionism insinuated itself into music.

It is therefore a great idea that the **Trio Talweg** had to invite us to discover in their company how their two Trios for piano and strings respond to each other, some thirty years apart.

That of **Saint-Saëns** combines majesty of the subject and instrumental refinements, while that of **Fauré**, a late and quasitestamentary page, imposes a more intimate language rich with exceptional emotional depth.

One of the most brilliant monuments in chamber music!


A loyal fan of the Colmar Festival, **Grigori Sokolov** returns this year with a formidable program mixing baroque and romanticism. Accustomed as we are to compartmentalizing eras and styles, we too often forget the debt that Chopin and Schumann owe to Bach, whom they venerated as a true god of music.

It is therefore to this often hidden heritage that Grigori Sokolov invites us, with some of the most personal pages of these composers: the brilliant *Partita* n°2 of the **Cantor**, two collections of *Mazurkas* by **Chopin**, which were a bit like the diary of his torn soul, and **Schumann**'s captivating *Forest Scenes*, where the romantic imagination is in full swing with unique poetry.

Julien Beautemps described as a "genius arranger" by France Musique, producing his own arrangements on stage as well as as a composer. His musical versatility is also expressed in his role as a seasoned chamber musician.

This concert highlights the "symphonic" accordion: a unique opportunity to discover or re-discover the repertoire, ranging from the avant-garde of Schulhoff to the jazz works of Busseuil as well as Mussorgsky's Pictures from an Exhibition in a version for classic accordion which promises to amaze.

With his exceptional talent, Julien Beautemps embodies musical diversity as well as international excellence.



Virtuoso trio, emblematic works Colmar Municipal Theater - 6:00 p.m.

We know François-Frédéric Guy's love for Beethoven. After the 32 sonatas and the 5 piano concertos, the musician turned to **chamber** music with violin and/or cello, with the help of Tedi Papavrami and Xavier Phillips.

For this concert, the three musicians in the fullness of their talent invite us to explore in their company the history of the piano trio since one of its first masterpieces, the *Trio No. 45* by **Haydn**, composer Viennese often considered the "father" of chamber music as we understand it today. It is both by remembering this glorious model, but also by freeing himself from it that **Beethoven** imagines his own trios, one of the absolute summits of which is none other than the famous Trio No. 5, known as "the Spirits", a title he owes to the strange atmosphere of its central movement: **Beethoven**

was then fascinated by Shakespeare's Macbeth, of which he once considered setting several striking pages to music including those about the witches!

At the other end of the century, **Brahms** takes up the torch and offers us with his Trio No. 3, one of his most absolute chamber monuments.

Kristian Bezuidenhout is part of a third generation of pianists to play Mozart on the fortepiano, from the first steps of Paul Badura-**Skoda** to the very beautiful recordings of **Andreas Staier**, including those of Jos van Immerseel.

He thus benefited from 50 years of research on ancient instruments and how to play them. Considered unrewarding and complicated, the pianoforte imposes many limits on its performers, limits that Kristian Bezuidenhout has exceeded, succeeding sublimating the instrument both technically and in the imagination.

The program for this concert includes two **Mozart** concertos: the very famous Concerto No. 9 "Young Man" and the poetic Concerto No. 17 with the Freiburger Barockorchester conducted by Gottfried von der Goltz on the violin.

In addition, the brilliant Symphony in G minor by Johann Christian Bach, already very "Sturm und Drang" in character, and the very modern Symphony No. 74 by Joseph Haydn.



With his *Fantasiestücke*, **Schumann** offers the clarinet wonderful solos, definitively establishing the emancipation of the instrument. At the end of his life, **Brahms**, his former protégé, also rediscovered the spells of this instrument with its extraordinary sonorities, and created with his two sonatas from Opus 120 a diptych which quickly established itself among the most beautiful masterpieces. work of the instrument's repertoire.

On our side of the Rhine, it was for a clarinet competition at the Paris Conservatory that **Debussy** composed his *Rhapsody*. As for **Gershwin**, who liked to mix jazz influences into his classical compositions, we know what place the clarinet plays in his brilliant *Rhapsody in Blue*. We are therefore delighted to find this page in a transcription for clarinet and piano!

Alain Altinoglu

Sensitive artist and sparkling conductor

Appointed musical director of the HR-Sinfonieorchester Frankfurt from the 2021/22 season, Alain Altinoglu has also held the position of musical director of the Théâtre Royal de la Monnaie since January 2016. In Brussels, he is widely recognized for his extraordinary leadership, inspiring intense and refined performance. Most recently, her dedicated work was recognized with a triple nomination at the International Opera Awards. Among the opera productions that Altinoglu is directing during the 2019/20 season in Brussels are Strauss' Der Rosenkavalier, Offenbach's Tales of Hoffmann, as well as the world premiere of Pascale Dusapin's Macbeth Underworld.



As a guest conductor, he regularly conducts orchestras such as the Wiener Philharmoniker, Berliner Philharmoniker, Symphonieorchester des Bayerischen Rundfunks, the Cleveland Orchestra, the Philharmonia Orchestra of Corchestra, Russian National Orchestra, Orchester symphonique de Montréal, the Philharmonia Orchestra of London, the Royal Stockholm Philharmonic Orchestra, the Sächsische Staatskapelle Dresden, the Rundfunk-Sinfonieorchester Berlin, the Deutsches Symphonie-Orchester Berlin, the Tonhalle Orchestra of Zurich as well as the major Parisian orchestras. Highlights of this 2019-20 season include debuts with the Royal Concertgebouworkest, NDR Elbphilharmonie Orchester Hamburg and Finnish Radio Symphony Orchestra. Altinoglu led the Orchester National de France in the annual July 14 concert, broadcast to millions of viewers around the world. He also appeared twice as a guest at the hr-Sinfonieorchester Frankfurt, and returned to conduct the Orchester de Paris, the London Symphony Orchestra, the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, and the Boston Symphony Orchestra with his own arrangement of the Pelléas Suite and Mélisande by Debussy, as well as the Danish National Symphony Orchestra and the Wiener Symphoniker at the prestigious Musikverein in Vienna.

For several years he has conducted in the greatest opera theaters such as the Metropolitan Opera of New York, the Royal Opera House Covent Garden, the Wiener Staatsoper, the Opernhaus Zürich, the Teatro Colón Buenos Aires, the Deutsche Oper Berlin, the Staatsoper Unter den Linden, the Bayerische Staatsoper München as well as the three opera houses of Paris. He is also invited to the Salzburg, Bayreuth, Chorégies d'Orange and Aix-en-Provence Festivals.

Particularly interested in the repertoire of lied and melody, Alain Altinoglu regularly accompanies mezzo-soprano Nora Gubisch on the piano. A recording of Henri Duparc's Mélodies was released in 2010 for the "Cascavelle" label. A recording of Ravel melodies was released in 2012 for the Naïve label. In 2014, the album "Folk Songs" with Nora Gubisch was released for the same label. Among his other discs: the opera "Fiesque" by Lalo with Roberto Alagna (Deutsche Gramophone), the cello concertos by Eric Tanguy with the Orchester National de France, "Le Serment" by Tansman with the Orchester Philharmonique de Radio France and Pèrelà by Pascal Dusapin for the Naïve label. A recording of Henryk Gorecki's Third Symphony with the Sinfonia Varsovia has also been released by Naïve.

Alain Altinoglu studied at the Conservatoire National Supérieur de Musique et de Danse in Paris. He has been there since 2014, Professor of the conducting class.

The 12:30 p.m.



Koïfhus (14-15th century) Capacity of 200 places

Completed around 1480, this building symbolized the political and economic power of Colmar. A former customs center closely linked to the wine economy of the Wine Capital of Alsace, the Koïfhus is today one of the beating hearts of Colmar life, whatever the season, which its recent masterful renovation has not made what to accentuate.

The 6:00 p.m.

Municipal Theater of Colmar (1849)
Capacity of 500 seats

The first theater built in Haute-Alsace, the Colmar municipal theater opened in 1849. The architect Louis-Michel Boltz designed an elegant, classic "French-style" exterior facade overlooking Rue Kléber. The room is designed in the tradition of "Italian-style" theaters, comprising three galleries. The interior decoration is due to the Parisian artist Boulangé, who also created the large ceiling painting in 1848.





The Prestige Concerts at 8:30 p.m.

Saint Matthieu Church (14th century)
Capacity of 750 places

Recently restored, this former Franciscan church, a remarkable example of the Gothic architecture of the mendicant orders, has very beautiful acoustics. The Festival thus offers very high quality concerts given in prestigious heritage sites.

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

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
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
